Australian, thirty-seven-years young, and winner of thirty-three Women's Squash Association (WSA) Tour titles, Rachael Grinham is currently the longest playing member on the WSA Tour. Grinham is a veteran in every sense of the word: tough, experienced, steady. Battling in professional tournaments since 1994, with no

mention of when she'll retire, Grinham has maintained a world top-twenty ranking since first reaching No. 18 in July 1997—and was a mainstay in the top ten for over a decade beginning in 2001.
