



The 56th Hahn Cup was won in February by Cincinnati, pictured above and captained by Tom Klinedinst, III. Featuring amateur players from Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Louisville, it is named after the late Joe Hahn, a former US Squash president, national champion and Midwest squash leader. It was first held in 1962 and now is the oldest annual inter-city team competition in the country.



Al Roker, the longtime NBC weather anchor, welcomed two dozen SEA members to the set of Today in Manhattan.
